As all of us in the Okanagan tried our best to live and work in the midst of a global pandemic, our communities were left with uncertainties in their work, school and lives. This was a time for BGC Okanagan to be there for children, youth and families. The priorities we established that carried us through the year included – stability, continuity and communication.

Today, we are proud to say, we continued offering essential services to the communities we serve throughout the Okanagan without interruption throughout the pandemic. We did so by pivoting, offering many of our programs virtually, and always going back to our priorities. We worked with local School Districts to provide essential service workers with vital childcare and kept all of our centres open to meet the needs of families. All counselling and support programs have remained open, with staff providing support through phone and the use of other technology. Staff in our youth programs continued to provide support and basic needs to our youth throughout the pandemic.

During the pandemic we not only provided stability for our Club families, but also for BGC Okanagan staff. A large majority of our staff remained employed with us, and became pillars of strength for our families by standing on the frontlines to ensure their children had a safe place. The staff showed incredible resiliency and we were able to recognize their efforts and the challenges they faced through increased compensation for the time they continued to provide direct service to our participants.

We are particularly proud of the communication that we maintained with staff and participants during this time. Through social media, we provided updates on programs to our Club members and the public at large. An internal newsletter was introduced to staff during the pandemic where we provided the latest updates on what was happening from the north to the south Okanagan, building connections throughout our organization. A crisis communications committee was created to ensure timely and accurate information was reaching our Club families and staff.

As well as ensuring continuity and stability within our programs and organization, over the last year we have also been working to grow our reach and services. This included virtual programming to give children, youth and families, especially those in remote communities, opportunities to continue connecting with our staff and their peers. We committed to this by hiring a virtual programs coordinator and started development on a unique platform to further enhance our virtual services.

We also were successful in receiving funding for four new childcare centres in partnership with School District #22 in the North Okanagan, as well as funding to build two new club locations in Vernon in partnership with the City of Vernon. In the Central Okanagan, in partnership with School District #23, we applied for funding for three new club locations. All of these new sites will allow us to expand our services to children, youth and families in these communities – services that are more vital today than ever.

Also this year, in partnership with School District 23 and several local stakeholders, we successfully launched Upstream Kelowna. Upstream is an early intervention and prevention program to youth homelessness. It is one of only two pilot programs in Canada. In the Spring of 2021 we hosted an online kickoff event which saw local municipal, provincial and federal politicians, our community partners and other key stakeholders in attendance.

In the second half of the year we began work on the re-branding from Boys and Girls Clubs of the Okanagan to BGC Okanagan. After the national office consulted with LGBTQ2S+ community members, stakeholders, youth and Club leadership from across the country, Clubs collectively made the change to using BGC instead of Boys and Girls Clubs. This is because we open our doors to all children, youth and families, and we believe our name should reflect that. Changing from the dated, non-inclusive language also embraces the fact that we serve young people and families of all ages, background and identities.

This past year also allowed us to further look at our facilities and how we can continue to improve, upgrade and provide the best for our Club members and families. After 20 years in the same location, the Lake Country Club found a new home in the new Multi Aged Centre (MAC). With the support of the District of Lake Country we now have a new facility to welcome children, youth and families to in the Fall of 2021.

Over the next year, we know we will have to navigate the long-term impacts of the pandemic. We remain committed to ensuring continuity and stability as we navigate these uncertain times to make sure our services are there for all children, youth and families. As well, we work to expand our programs and services to support more participants. We know the importance of providing these opportunities to the children, youth and families we serve because opportunity changes everything.



UPSTREAM KELOWNA

For many years we have been getting involved when the crisis of youth homelessness and school disengagement has already hit and then trying to support youth to tip the scales back so they have a chance to grow up healthy, happy and thriving adults. Through launching and leading Upstream Kelowna we knew there was potential to reduce inflow to youth homelessness by intervening before the crisis hits.

BGC Okanagan is the local lead organization in piloting Upstream Kelowna, and through early assessment and intervention with youth, we believe we can not only protect young people and their families from experiencing crisis and escalating risk, but effectively turn off the tap to homelessness.



VIRIUAL PROGRAMS

We are committed to offering virtual programs to communities across the Okanagan Valley, with main hubs providing Activity Kits for pick up. In 2020, we hired a Virtual Programs Coordinator to explore building a BGC Okanagan platform to enhance our offerings. In the meantime, staff used a variety of virtual platforms to create quality, fun, and engaging virtual experiences for children, youth and families.

Staff attended training offered through Jays Care Foundation and BGC Canada to create program plans and use resources to support virtual programs.

LAKE COUNTRY PROJECT

The MAC building, being completed by the District of Lake Country, is an innovative, purpose-built, flexible community facility that will provide a centrally-located place for the Lake Country Boys and Girls Club and sustainable community activity programming for the growing municipality. The three-storey building is a 19,000 sq. ft. multi-functional building.

Also home to the Lake Country Seniors Activity Society, The MAC will meet the needs of invidivuals of all ages. The improvements will serve to better integrate the distinct spaces contributing to a vibrant healthy community.

We are so excited for the opportunity to operate current and new programs in this beautiful facility, which is expected to open in September 2021.
