For BGC Okanagan, 2022 was defined by economic challenges, including ongoing labour and general supply shortages and increased costs from inflation. As a result, Clubs faced sharp increases in operating costs and significant staffing challenges.

Amid this climate of economic uncertainty, we were also dealing with the toll that the COVID-19 pandemic has taken on our children and youth. Issues of mental health and learning loss continue to dominate news headlines and remain a top priority at our Clubs. We anticipate the pandemic's long-term impacts - while unknown - will continue to be significant.

Despite all these challenges, BGC Okanagan has much to be proud of. Our brand awareness is growing. We introduced new programs and services throughout the Okanagan

# **Strong Clubs**

In 2022, BGC Canada launched our Learning & Impact Project aimed to prove and improve Club impact across Canada. This study helps us better tell the story of Club impact by gathering quantitative (survey) and qualitative (interviews) data from Clubs across Canada.

The qualitative work of the project is one of the largest studies of its kind in Canada and the data to date, points to the transformational impact a Club has on a young person's life. Our youth are more confident, more resilient, and make better choices because of a Club.

We were also focused on continuing to open new facilities to fill the need for child care that exists in communities up and down the valley. Our team worked hard to complete our new service locations in Vernon and Kelowna. We will continue in the coming year to open new facilities in West Kelowna, Kelowna and Summerland.

Additionally, we were also able to add new \$10 a day programs as we continue to apply to the province to make more of our locations accessible for our families. We are hoping that funding from the Provincial government will continue to be awarded to our locations over the next year

Additionally, BGC Okanagan generated healthy support from the Stober Foundation. We successfully increased awareness and funding from the community by accepting their invitation to be involved with the Tree of Hope campaign.

Along with partners Landmark District and TD Canada Trust, over \$1 million was raised and donated to BGC Okanagan and YMCA of the Southern Interior.

# **Strong Voice**

In 2022, BGC brand awareness continued to grow.

Our brand campaign, "Unbelievable Impact," leveraged the Learning & Impact results, using data to highlight how BGC positively impacts the lives of children and youth. Campaign elements were also customized for BGC Okanagan and handed out or displayed at awareness events such as Pink Shirt Day, McHappy Day and at the Acera Insurance Golf 4 Kids events.

In our second year as BGC Okanagan, we continued to champion our new identity including social media toolkits for local businesses to help us celebrate BGC Club Day, the continuation of changing over buildings and vehicles with the new branding and advertising on the radio and digitally with our new logo to amplify locally.

# **Strong Communities**

Reconciliation continues to be a focus area for BGC Okanagan.

Nationally, BGC is proud to sign a memorandum of understanding with the National Association of Friendship Centres to continue our commitment to creating opportunities for youth to come together to learn from each other. BGC also celebrated their first Indigenous Youth of the Year.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) training was made available to Clubs across the Okanagan. Our staff participated in a three-part series of Transformative Reconciliation training with Dr. Dustin Louie. These discussions and and insights were truly enlightening as we look forward to carrying on the examination of

our organization and how we can go beyond acknowledging and contribute to acts of reconciliation within our work and personal lives.

Nationally, BGC strengthened the anti-racism and 2SLGBTQIA+ toolkits introduced at the end of 2021 by adding lessons to the BGC Canada e-learning site.

# **Stronger Together**

We were able have staff participate at the 2022 BGC Canada National Conference & Leadership Symposium in Saskatoon, the first in-person conference in three years. Reuniting after years apart due to COVID-19 was an important reminder of the strength of our movement.

Throughout the year, our team continued to provide strong support to Clubs. This teamwork was reflected in the staff survey, where among the things that staff said motivate them to come to work is the people, the difference being made in the community, the staff/team, and BGC Okanagan's vision, mission and values.

Our future lies in telling our story, growing our profile, and relentlessly advocating for the communities we serve. We are inspired by the critical work being done by our Clubs and those in communities across the country.

As we close out 2022, we would also like to thank our board of directors, all our volunteers and our amazing staff team. We are stronger as Clubs and as a movement because of your contributions


