As I reflect on the past year, I am incredibly proud of what we have accomplished together. It has been a year of growth, investment, and continued commitment to our vision of creating opportunities for children, youth, and families across the Okanagan. Most importantly, it has been a year that demonstrated what is possible when committed individuals come together with a shared purpose.

Our strategic plan provided a clear focus for the year, and we made meaningful progress across each of our priority areas.

We continued to invest in our people and in creating a thriving workplace. This year, we strengthened the ways we recognize and celebrate the incredible contributions of our staff, including introducing Life Saving Awards to our staff recognition program. We also launched an organization-wide employee engagement survey, giving our people an important opportunity to share their experiences, thoughts, and perspectives and help shape the future of BGC Okanagan. From our work related to the transition of childcare to the Ministry of Education to advocacy for ECE wage enhancement, we continued to ensure that the experiences and needs of the communities we serve are part of important conversations and decisions.

Perhaps most importantly, we continued to deepen and expand our life-changing impact. We worked with Steve Patty to develop and implement an evaluation tool for our Upstream Program, advanced plans for new childcare opportunities in Kelowna, Summerland, and Peachland, and strengthened our approach to organizational and cyber risk management. At the same time, we continued investing in the systems and technology that support our staff and allow us to deliver high-quality programs and services.

Behind every one of these accomplishments are our people.

Our staff are the reason BGC Okanagan continues to move forward. Every day, our teams show up for children, youth, families, and communities with compassion, creativity, professionalism, and determination.

FOSTER A CULTURE OF BELONGING

Improving accessibility for Club members

BGC Okanagan invested in accessibility improvements to reduce barriers for children, youth, families, staff, and visitors.

The Playground Accessibility Pilot Project introduced Mobi-Mats, creating stable pathways over uneven terrain for children using mobility aids. Mats were installed at North Glenmore and South Rutland, with additional mats added to the Children and Youth with Supportive Needs (CYSN) resource library for use at other sites. The mats quickly became popular with all children, who nicknamed them the “car racetrack.”

Facility upgrades at Rutland and Martin Avenue included accessible washroom improvements, a safety railing, and automatic doors, including a video buzzer system at Martin Avenue’s accessible entrance.

Together, these investments make BGC Okanagan spaces more accessible and inclusive.



STRENGTHENING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Digital tools that strengthen family connections

BGC Okanagan introduced EsiKidz, a childcare management platform that helps improve the experience for families while supporting our day-to-day operations.

Families can register online, receive program updates, access billing information and tax receipts, communicate with their child's program, and securely sign children in and out. Having these services in one place makes it easier for families to stay connected with their child's care.



For our staff, EsiKidz has simplified many administrative tasks, including enrollment, attendance, reporting, funding administration, and daily program operations.

By reducing paperwork and improving access to information, our teams can spend more time where it matters most, supporting children, building relationships with families, and delivering quality childcare.



DEEPEN AND EXPAND LIFE-CHANGING IMPACTS

Now supporting youth and families across the Shuswap - from Salmon Arm to Sicamous to Malakwa

In partnership with the Ministry of Children and Family Development, our Salmon Arm youth team provides family preservation, youth outreach and intervention, independent living supports, and youth justice services that help young people and families navigate life's most challenging transitions

Each year, between 75 and 100 youth and their families access these services, receiving individualized support that strengthens stability, builds resilience, and creates opportunities for brighter futures.

Young people in Salmon Arm and surrounding areas are securing safe housing, developing the skills and confidence needed to live independently, strengthening communication and relationships, improving access to healthcare, and achieving better overall health and well-being.

By walking alongside youth and families through periods of change, we are helping build stronger connections, healthier relationships, and lasting foundations for success.



Strong partnerships supporting quality child care

The demand for quality childcare continues to grow across the Okanagan and meeting that need is only possible through strong community partnerships. BGC Okanagan is proud to work alongside municipalities and school districts to create new childcare spaces that support children, families, and healthy communities.

These projects represent more than new childcare spaces. They reflect a shared commitment to investing in children, supporting families, and strengthening communities.

By working together with our municipal and school district partners, we are creating welcoming places where children can learn, engage in fun activities, have a place to belong while helping meet the increasing need for quality childcare across the Okanagan.

GROWTH IN 2025:

- ➔ opening of our **new Hudson Road Childcare Centre**, developed in partnership with School District 23 and located next to Hudson Road Elementary
- ➔ we began offering **school-age childcare at Davidson Road Elementary** in Lake Country
- ➔ preparing to open a **new licensed childcare program at Shannon Lake Elementary**, further expanding access for families within School District 23.

ELEVATE INFLUENCE
